

PrEP MONITORING PANEL (FEMALE)

WHO SHOULD GET THIS TEST?

This panel is useful for people who are taking PrEP medication.

WHY IS THIS TEST IMPORTANT?

It is recommended to have lab testing done at regular intervals when using PrEP. This testing is used to check for HIV and other STDs, and to assess your kidney and liver health. These tests will help your healthcare provider ensure that your treatment is working effectively.

The PrEP Monitoring Panel includes 6 tests:

1. Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)- This is a virus that attacks the immune system. If left untreated, HIV can lead to AIDS (acquired immunodeficiency syndrome). Currently, there is no cure for HIV; however, it can be managed with medications that reduce the viral load, or the amount of HIV in the blood.
2. Syphilis (RPR)- Syphilis is a bacterial infection that can have serious consequences if left untreated. It develops in stages: primary stage, secondary stage, latent stage, and tertiary stage. Symptoms vary with each stage, and it is possible to have syphilis for several years without noticing symptoms.
3. Gonorrhea & Chlamydia- Gonorrhea and chlamydia are the most common bacterial STDs in the United States. They are treatable with antibiotics, but if left untreated, they can lead to serious health issues in the future.
4. Basic Metabolic Panel (BMP) (includes Creatinine with eGFR)- The BMP provides valuable information about your kidney function, electrolytes, and blood sugar.
5. Hepatic Function Panel- This test provides detailed information about your liver health.
6. Beta hCG (Qualitative)- This test is used to detect pregnancy.
